	21.6.44	After try out the above times it was found that the lack of daylight early in the
		morning was a great inconvenience and in view of the sudden drop in temperatures,
		working hours were amended as follows.

		Commence work: 17.00 hrs. Cease work:- 19.00 hrs.
	24.6.44	Captain R.G. Porter A.D.C. to the Governor of Bengal visited R.A.F. Digri by air.
		During his brief stay he was able to hold an informal interview with the Australian
		aircrew personnel on the Squadron.
	25.6.44	No.3 Hill Party returned to Digri from Chakrata.
	26.6.44.	A very heavy thunderstorm was experienced during the morning and lightning struck
		the two telephone exchanges on the Station, completely burning out the cables to 159
		Squadron exchange. The two switchboard operators and many personnel using phones
		at the time were subjected to a considerable electrical shock. F/O. Farden and F/Lt. M. Carson who were sitting in the Squadron Navigation Office but not touching a
		telephone both suffered from severe shock and burns for which they were treated at
		Station Sick quarters. All damaged telephones and lines were repaired the same day.
		During the month, three airmen's billets collapsed owing to heavy rain. The personnel
		were rehoused in one wing of the dining hall, a portion of the recreation room and on
		the Wing Domestic Site.
		Welfare and Sports Notes.
		The most outstanding item of interest during the month was a drive to raise the
		standard of messing for the airmen. This was not due to complaints from the men but
		to a desire on the part of the cooks and the Officer i/c Airmen's Messing to raise the
		standard to as high a level as possible. The result was highly successful and mail
		censoring officers report that when writing home, airmen are making numerous
		reference to the good quality of the food now being served.
		S/Ldr. J. Blackburn D.S.O. D.F.C., has offered to take an active interest in the welfare
		of the airmen and it is proposed to call a meeting early in July when a number of
		officers will each be given the task of supervising one particular aspect of welfare. It
		has been found that owing to the Squadron being continuously on operational duties,
		no one officer could devote sufficient time to the duties of Welfare Officer to ensure
		that all aspects of welfare were supervised adequately.  With the move of the Squadron from Dhubalia and the approach of the hottest period
		before the monsoon there has been no great sporting activity. A General Sports
		meeting was well attended and plans for the coming season were discussed. A new
		soccer pitch has been marked out the new goals and nets erected. A hockey pitch is
		under construction. Hockey, soccer, and soft ball are the only games being played this
		season, rugby football having being disallowed by the Medical Officer. Soft ball,
		introduced by the Canadian personnel is becoming very popular amongst aircrew.
		Wing Commander Hopkins, D.F.C. has presented a cup to be played for in a knockout
		soccer competition.

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		In the final of the W/Cdr. Boffee Cup Darts Tournament the Instrument Repairers beat
		the Cooks by 5 games to 3.
		Photographic Section Report.
		Only four night camera sorties were carried out by 159 Squadron during the month of June and out of these only one result was secured owing to the ground being obscured by cloud. Daylight sorties numbered 17 including the use of one oblique camera. Successful results were obtained in all cases except one when no ground detail was
		recorded due to cloud.
		Medical Notes.
		During the month of June, there were 15 cases of effects of heat. All occurred between
		the 16/6 and 22/6 (inclusive). Three were of the hyperpynecial type the remainder
		were of the mild pynecial type with symptoms of exhaustion. One of the former group
		ended fatally.
		On 25.6. during a local thunderstorm, 2 officers were struck by lightning. Both were superficially burned on the legs and both experienced numbness of the lower extremities. In one, the left leg was primarily affected and on examination showed
		intense blanching indicative of a degree of vaso motor spasm. The other showed signs
		only in his toes which were cold and white – pulsation in both feet was normal. Full power in both cases was recovered in 2 hours.
